



Background

- On 23 June 2023, DDMM launched the National Strategy for Identity Resilience (the Strategy) and agreed
 detailed plans and budgets for initiatives under the Strategy be considered at future meetings, following the
 Commonwealth's response to the myGov User Audit.
 - The Government released its response to the myGov User Audit Report on 18 December 2023.
- The Strategy consists of short-term or immediate initiatives (up to 12 months to implement), medium-term initiatives (1-3 years to implement), and long-term initiatives (3-5 years to implement). Immediate initiatives under the Strategy include:
 - o Update of the National Identity Proofing Guidelines
 - o Identity resilience education and awareness
 - Cohesive national approach for responding to the identity security aspects of data breaches.
- The paper proposes the "cohesive national approach for responding to the identity security aspects of data breaches" initiative to be considered finalised, following establishment of the National Cyber Security Coordinator role, the National Office of Cyber Security and the Cyber Security Response Coordination Unit within the Department of Home Affairs.

Handling

- Advise the Commonwealth is committed to providing secure, convenient, voluntary and inclusive way to verify identity online.
- Note on 30 November 2023 Commonwealth Digital ID legislation was introduced into the Commonwealth Parliament. The legislation was referred to Senate Economics Legislation Committee, with the Committee's report due on 28 February 2024.
- Advise the draft legislation is intended to:
 - strengthen the existing voluntary accreditation scheme and provide legislative authority for the Australian Government's Digital ID System to expand
 - strengthen privacy and consumer protections
 - set up a stronger governance framework, including establishing the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission as the interim Digital ID regulator.
- Note Commonwealth will continue partnering with states and territories to deliver a national Digital ID System and work through outstanding issues raised in feedback on the draft legislation.
- Ask if members have any comments on the progress of the Commonwealth Digital ID legislation.
- Ask if members have any comments on the indicative digital ID priorities for 2024-25 raised in the paper.
- Ask if members agree all jurisdictions work together to progress a National Digital Identity Strategy, by mid-2024, to guide development of an updated National Digital ID Service Transformation Roadmap.
 - We have a Roadmap agreed by the DDMM in February 2023.
 - National Cabinet requires DDMM to maintain it, including reportable milestones. An update of the Roadmap will ensure it supports the Strategy, remains current and fit for purpose by outlining initiatives in all jurisdictions which contribute to a national interoperable digital ID system.
 - Jurisdictions are working to update the Roadmap, with the first step being to agree a national strategy so updates are aligned to a vision and strategic outcomes.
- Note Cross-Jurisdictional Verifiable Credentials Working Group has met regularly to progress work on establishing nationally consistent policy settings for verifiable credentials.
- Ask members if the Commonwealth can update on the new digital statutory declaration function?
 - Changes to the Commonwealth Statutory Declarations Act 1959 allow people to use myGov to create a digital Commonwealth statutory declaration, using their Digital Identity in place of a witness.
 - o The myGov digital capability for Commonwealth statutory declarations was launched on 12 February
 - This digital execution capability is expected to save \$156 million a year in direct costs and time savings for Australians.

Background

- The approach to develop the national strategy ahead of the detailed Roadmap reflects strong representations
 from states and territories to focus on the strategy first which would then inform appropriate entries on the
 Roadmap.
- National Cabinet requires DDMM to maintain a Digital ID Roadmap, including reportable milestones.
 - On 24 February 2023, DDMM agreed the current Digital ID Roadmap, bringing together input from the Commonwealth and all states and territories to show digital ID activities planned for 2023-24.
 - On 29 September 2023, DDMM commissioned an update to the Digital ID Roadmap to ensure it continues to be fit for purpose as Digital ID transitions to a fully legislated regime.
- At the 23 June 2023 meeting Ministers agreed to establish a cross-Jurisdictional verifiable credentials working group, co-led by the Commonwealth, Queensland and Victoria, to shape the policy for verifiable credentials and guide implementation.
 - Terms of reference for the working group and high-level policy principles have been agreed. The
 working group has undertaken an environmental scan of initiatives underway across jurisdictions to
 understand potential opportunities for alignment and collaboration.
 - The working group last convened in January 2024. The current focus is developing recommendations
 for a consistent approach to trust frameworks to support interoperability of verifiable credentials
 across jurisdictions.
 - The working group has met five times since September 2023 to progress work on establishing nationally consistent policy settings for verifiable credentials (one additional meeting was held in January 2024, after the meeting paper was drafted).
 - Digital Driver Licences are publicly available in South Australia, NSW and QLD. Victoria is currently undertaking a pilot, based in Ballarat. Other jurisdictions are considering the feasibility of digital licences.



- Note Digital Inclusion is a standing agenda item, and the Commonwealth proposes an extended discussion be allocated for this item at the next DDMM, with the Hon Michelle Rowland MP, Minister for Communications, and Ms Dorothy West AO, Chair of the First Nations Digital Inclusion Advisory Group (Advisory Group), to be invited to attend.

- Note with respect to the two priority initiatives earmarked in the paper to be implemented by the Commonwealth:
 - Community Wi-Fi grants The Prime Minister announced on 13 February 2024 the Government will
 provide free community Wi-Fi in around 20 remote communities, in partnership with NBN Co. As part
 of this measure, a digital ambassador will be employed in each community to support digital literacy.
 - Increasing the Telephone Allowance The Department of Social Services reviews all social security payments ahead of each Commonwealth Budget. The Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development, Communications and the Arts is engaging with DSS on this review noting the recommendation of the Advisory Group to increase the telephone allowance.

Background

- At the 23 June 2023 DDMM, Ministers agreed to re-establish the Digital Inclusion Working Group to explore
 initiatives to advance digital inclusion for First Nations people in collaboration with the First Nations Digital
 Inclusion Advisory Group.
- The "priority initiatives" identified in the paper are taken from the initial report of the Advisory Group, published in 2023. One of those initiatives is to "develop a national connectivity map".
 - Given a "First Nations Connectivity Map" was developed by the Department of Infrastructure,
 Transport, Regional Development, Communications and the Arts, there could be an opportunity for jurisdictions to provide additional data for inclusion in this map.
- The Commonwealth has asked Northern Territory to focus DDMM attention on initiatives requiring crossjurisdictional collaboration (as opposed to initiatives which are the sole remit of the Commonwealth) such as "partnering with telcos to provide grants for community Wi-Fi" and an "increase [to] the Telephone Allowance".

We also appreciate Queensland agreeing to continue working with Office of the National Data Commissioner to test ingestion of data into the Australian Government Data Catalogue.
 - a project co-led by the Australian Institute for Health and Welfare (AIHW) and ACT to identify how arrangements for the National Disability Data Asset (NDDA) and Australian National Data Integration Infrastructure (ANDII) will inform future data integration initiatives. This project will help ensure Commonwealth agencies appropriately prioritise and sequence their data sharing requests to jurisdictions, and in doing so minimise the burden on states and territories. This project proposes using Medicare Consumer Directory and hospitals data to test data flows. Thank you ACT for agreeing to co-lead this project.
- Note there is one portfolio-specific project to develop nationally consistent data on Family and Domestic Violence.
 - This project represents the strong commitment of Data and Digital Ministers and Women and Women's Safety Ministers to make good progress on ending gender-based violence in one generation.
 - With your support AIHW and DSS will lead a project to enhance consistency and sharing of family and domestic violence data which will improve decisions about service planning and delivery.
 - A test data flow is critical to getting the best outcome. I thank Victoria for considering partnering with the Commonwealth to share your expertise in family and domestic violence data reporting.
 - Very pleased to say we have endorsement from Minister Rishworth (as co-chair of the Women and Women's Safety Ministerial Council) and from NSW and ACT – thank you Minister Dib (NSW) and Minister Steel (ACT).
 - This means the FDV project will be added to the Work Program.
- Note this paper includes an update on implementing recommendations from the Review of the Intergovernmental Agreement on Data Sharing, agreed by Ministers at the 29 September 2023 DDMM (Attachment B to the paper).

Jurisdictions prefer focusing their limited resources and combined effort on National Disability Data Asset (NDDA) and Australian National Data Integration Infrastructure. The Commonwealth acknowledges these concerns.

address this sensitivity. It aims to build on the significant work to design and establish the NDDA and ANDII.

These initial priority areas will provide us with some key insights into how people with disability interact with the health, hospitals and disability services sector.

Thank members for jurisdictions' participation in the cross-jurisdictional life events working group to develop a new approach to intergovernmental collaboration on "life events".

Note:

- o A life event occurs in a person's life where they experience a major change, planned or unplanned, such as the birth of a child or recovering from a natural disaster, or even having your identity stolen as we discussed with the Attorney-General at Item 3.
- During key life events our constituents interact more with government (sometimes more than one level of government), often during times of high stress. Understanding life events allows governments to orient services around people's needs, rather than how we are organised.
- For example, it can be intimidating for a young person searching for full-time employment the first time.
 - Although there are services available to support people into employment, building awareness of those services and how to find them is a challenge.
 - In times past, a young person would have to look up services like apprenticeships or graduate positions individually.
 - States and territories have since developed "Front door" employment websites, where someone who is considering employment for the first time is prompted to answer questions which point them toward services appropriate to their circumstances.
 - Initiatives such as these provide citizens with streamlined access to information, making it easier for them to start, stay in or change employment.
- A revitalised National Life Events Program aims to align our efforts to ensure Australians have access to consistent services when faced with a life event.
- Note the new Direction (Attachment A) and Framework (Attachment B) provides a way for DDMM to identify initiatives and projects to support the Life Event Program, while reducing the costs and resource implications of delivery.
- Note a 5-year plan of proposed initiatives to apply the Framework will support this new approach to Life Events, and is consistent with recommendation 8 of the myGov User Audit.

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Data and Digital Ministers Meeting



<u>Background</u>

- On 4 November 2022, DDMM commissioned a review of the Cross Jurisdictional Life Events Program. The
 review found a need for a revitalised approach to life events to reduce inconsistency across jurisdictions.
- In June 2023, DDMM endorsed the findings and recommendations of the Cross-Jurisdictional Life Events
 Review (the Review). DDMM also agreed the Commonwealth lead implementation of recommendations in
 collaboration with states and territories.
- Recommendation 8 of the myGov User Audit provides the Commonwealth should "partner with the states and territories on a 5-year plan to make it easy for people to find and do what they need to across all levels of government". The Government agreed to this recommendation in its response to the Audit and this will be actioned through recommendation (b) in this paper.
